Racism in Japan

I think there is discrimination among Japanese people. This is because discrimination has a long history and is based on the value of each individual, even if the SDGs set a goal of eliminating discrimination. For example, sex, or so-called gender issues, which have become an international issue, bullying children, human rights of the elderly, and human rights of people with disabilities. Moreover, not only is an important foundation of culture and tradition being lost as the people of culture are aging due to the policy of assimilation but discrimination and prejudice in employment, marriage exist and harm some people on the basis of ethnicity. This status system led to severe discrimination for some people in all aspects of life, including housing, work, marriage, and dating. Thirdly, It is discrimination against foreigners. People from many different countries come to Japan as workers, students, and tourists. Of course, there are Japanese people who do not have prejudice and

discrimination. However, this problem is a real phenomenon, even if it is a part of the problem.
